- ebb: to move away from the land; to fade away. "The tide will ebb in the evening."
- ear: the part of the body used for hearing. "She whispered something funny in my ear."
- eat: to put food into the mouth and swallow it. "We can eat pizza tonight."
- egg: an oval object from which a young animal is born. "I found a bird egg in the nest."
- ego: a person's sense of self-importance. "It's good to have confidence, but not too much ego."
- elf: a small, magical creature in stories. "The elf hid behind the tree."
- elm: a type of tree. "The elm tree provides a lot of shade."
- end: the final part of something. "The movie will end in ten minutes."
- era: a period of time noted for its events, people, or other characteristics. "Dinosaurs lived in a different era."
- eve: the evening or day before a special day. "On Christmas Eve, we hang up our stockings."
- eye: the organ of sight. "The eye sees color and shapes."

- each: individual things in a group of two or more things. "Each of the cookies was decorated differently."
- ease: to make something less severe or more comfortable. "Let's ease into learning with a fun game."
- echo: a sound that is reflected off a surface and heard again. "Your shout in the cave might create an echo."
- edge: the outside limit of an object, area, or surface. "Be careful not to cut yourself on the sharp edge."

- edit: to make changes to text or film. "Let's edit our story to make it better."
- else: in addition; besides. "What else would you like to play?"
- emit: to send out a form of light, heat, or sound. "The lamp will emit a bright light."
- etch: to cut into a surface with a sharp tool. "The machine can etch a design into metal."
- even: flat, smooth, or level. "Make sure the seesaw is even so both sides are balanced."
- ever: at any time. "Have you ever seen a shooting star?"
- evil: very bad or harmful. "Fairy tales often have an evil witch."
- exam: a test to show a person's knowledge or skill. "We will have a spelling exam tomorrow."
- exit: a way out of a place. "This door is the exit."
- expo: a large exhibition. "We went to a science expo at school."

- east: the direction where the sun rises. "We watched the sun rise in the east."
- elbow: the joint in the middle of the arm where it bends. "He bumped his elbow on the door."
- elder: a person who is older. "Ask your elder sister to help you with your homework."
- elect: to choose someone for a position by voting. "They will elect a new class president."
- elegy: a sad poem or song, often in memory of someone who has died. "They read an elegy at the memorial."
- element: a basic part of something. "Water is an important element for all living things."
- elephant: a large, gray mammal with a long trunk. "The elephant lifted its trunk to say hello."
- elevate: to lift up or make higher. "The doctor said to elevate my ankle after injuring it."
- excited: having a large amount of happiness and eagerness for something. "He was excited for his birthday party."

- elite: a group that is superior in terms of ability or qualities. "She is part of the elite math team."
- elope: to run away secretly to get married. "The story is about a couple who decide to elope."
- embark: to start a journey or venture. "They embark on a quest for hidden treasure."
- embrace: to hug or accept something enthusiastically. "She wrapped her mother in a big embrace."

- enact: to make into law. "The city will enact a new safety rule."
- enjoy: to take pleasure in something. "We enjoy playing outside."
- enough: as much as is needed. "She had enough cookies for everyone."
- enter: to go or come into a place. "Please enter the room quietly."
- entire: whole or complete. "We spent the entire day at the park."
- entry: the act of entering or a place for entering. "The front entry was decorated for the holiday."
- envelope: a flat, usually square or rectangular, paper container for a letter. "She put the letter in the envelope."
- equal: being the same in quantity, size, degree, or value. "Everyone is equal in this game."
- erase: to remove written or drawn marks. "Use the eraser to erase the mistake."
- erode: to gradually wear away by natural forces. "The river can erode the bank over time."
- error: a mistake. "There was an error in the calculation."
- escape: to get free from something, or to avoid something. "The rabbit will escape from the garden."
- esteem: respect and admiration. "She holds her teacher in high esteem."
- ethics: rules of behavior based on ideas about what is morally good and bad. "We learned about ethics in class today."
- expand: to increase in size, number, or importance. "The balloon will expand when you blow into it."

- economy: how goods and services are produced, sold, and bought in a region. "The local economy is growing due to new businesses opening up"
- effect: a change that is a result or consequence of an action or other cause. "The medicine had an immediate effect on her symptoms."
- effort: a focused or determined attempt. "He put a lot of effort into finishing the project on time."
- either: a choice between one thing or another. "You can either stay here or come with us."
- employ: to provide work to someone and pay them for it. "The new factory will employ hundreds of people."
- empty: containing nothing; not filled or occupied. "He found the box was empty."
- enable: give someone the means to do something; to make something possible. "This scholarship will enable her to attend college."
- endure: to get through something that's difficult with patience. "They had to endure a long wait before the doctor arrived."
- energy: the strength required for sustained physical or mental activity. "After a good night's sleep, she was full of energy."
- engine: a machine with moving parts that converts power into motion. "The car's engine needs to be repaired."

Food Words

- eclair: a long pastry filled with cream and topped with chocolate icing. "She ordered an eclair from the bakery."
- edamame: young soybeans, often served steamed and salted. "We ordered edamame as a starter."
- eggplant: a purple, egg-shaped vegetable. "She added eggplant to the curry."
- eggnog: a holiday drink made with milk, cream, sugar, whipped eggs, and spices. "I love drinking eggnog during the holidays."
- elderberry: a small, dark purple berry known for its health benefits. "Elderberry syrup is said to boost your immune system."
- empanada: a baked or fried pastry filled with meat, cheese, or other ingredients. "We made empanadas for dinner."

- enchilada: a corn tortilla rolled around a filling and covered with chili sauce. "He ordered chicken enchiladas at the restaurant."

- east: a cardinal direction, opposite of west, where the sun rises. "We traveled toward the east to watch the sunrise."

- euphoria: a feeling of intense excitement and happiness. "Winning the award filled her with euphoria."
- envy: a feeling of wishing you had something that someone else has. "He felt a bit of envy over his friend's new bike."
- eagerness: a strong desire and enthusiasm to do something. "Her eagerness to learn made her an excellent student."

- elation: great happiness and excitement. "Elation swept over them when they heard the good news."
- embarrassment: a feeling of self-consciousness or awkwardness. "His stumble caused him great embarrassment."
- enigmatic: difficult to interpret or understand; mysterious. "His enigmatic smile puzzled everyone."
- exasperation: a feeling of intense irritation or annoyance. "His sibling's teasing led to his exasperation."

- emerge: move in order to become visible. "The sun will emerge from behind the clouds soon."
- encourage: to give support, confidence, or hope to someone. "Teachers should encourage students to ask questions."
- endorse: to declare one's public approval or support of something. "The celebrity endorsed the new product."
- entertain: to provide someone with amusement or enjoyment. "She loves to entertain guests at her home."
- envelop: to wrap up, cover, or surround completely. "Fog began to envelop the city."
- eradicate: to destroy completely; to put an end to. "The program aims to eradicate poverty in the region."

- estimate: to form an approximate judgment or opinion regarding the worth, amount, size, weight, etc., of something. "He tried to estimate the cost of the repairs."
- examine: to inspect or study carefully. "The doctor will examine the patient thoroughly."
- enhance: to further improve upon something. "You can enhance the drawing by adding color to it."
- explore: to travel through an unfamiliar area in order to learn about it. "They love to explore new cities during their vacations."
- evolve: to develop gradually, especially from a simple to a more complex form. "The strategy will evolve over time."
